**OFFICE MEMORANDUM**

**Subject: Appointment of Prabhari Officers for 115 Backward districts**

The undersigned is directed to refer to the above mentioned subject and to say that senior officers at the level of Additional Joint Secretaries are hereby appointed as Prabhari Officers on behalf of Government of India for coordinating the efforts of the Centre and States in achieving rapid transformation of identified 115 backward districts by addressing their specific developmental needs. The above initiative is in consonance with the Prime Minister's vision of a 'New India' by 2022. The 115 backward districts have been identified based on select indicators of backwardness and prevalence of Left Wing Extremism etc. (The list of officers nominated as Prabhari Officers indicating their districts also is enclosed at **Annexure I**). The Prabhari Officers will work in a collaborative manner with the State and District teams to achieve effective convergence between various Central and State Government programmes. Steps are also being taken to establish a comprehensive database and an efficient feedback mechanism.

2. CEO, NITI Aayog has already written to the Chief Secretaries of various States/UTs in this regard (Copy of his letter is at **Annexure II**). For launching this initiative, a Workshop is being organized on 24th November at **CSOI Auditorium, New Delhi** which will be chaired by the Cabinet Secretary. All Prabhari Officers are required to attend the Workshop in which the details of this initiative will be discussed.

3. The officers may kindly be directed to reach the venue of the Workshop by **10.30 AM** on **24<sup>th</sup> November, 2017**. **Subject: Convergence, Integration and Focussed attention to Backward Districts.**

As you are aware, the Hon'ble Prime Minister of India has given a call for a new India by 2022, the year we celebrate our 75<sup>th</sup> year of Independence.

2. Though the Indian economy is poised on a high growth trajectory, there are pockets of underdevelopment in the country that impose a major governance challenge. There is an urgent need to raise the level of socio-economic development of these their backward areas to bring about balanced and inclusive growth in the country. Raising the level would also improve the national performance in various human development indicators.

3. In this context, the Government of India proposes to work with the States to launch a special initiative to rapidly transform 115 backward districts by addressing their specific developmental needs. Niti Aayog has identified 30 most backward districts with a maximum of five districts in a State on the basis of a composite index. The data sets used for this index include SECC Deprivation, Nutrition and health data (NHFS4); Elementary education data (UDISE 2015-16) and data pertaining to households without electrifications, without access to drinking water and toilets and un-connected villages. List of these indicators and respective weight attached to them are enclosed.

4. In addition to these 30 districts, different Ministries have identified a pool of 50 districts on the basis of this index where they would be converging their efforts for improvement in the outcome.

5. In case you would like to suggest any replacement of district on the basis of any objective criteria, Niti Aayog is open to such suggestions. List of the district(s), proposed to be taken up in your State is enclosed. This is in addition to 35 LWE Districts in which the Ministry of Home Affairs is already implementing a sub-component of their Police modernisation Scheme.

6. The strategy envisaged under this initiative is to ensure effective convergence between various Central and State Government programmes, establishment of an efficient feedback mechanism and to provide a platform for replicating best practices from other districts. For overall supervision of the programme at the Central Government level, an Empowered Committee of Secretaries (ECS) is being set up which will be empowered to modify the guidelines of schemes within the approved outlays and other parameters, in order to make them more effective. Further, Flexi Funds available under various schemes can be deployed innovatively to fill the critical gaps observed in the field.

7. However, the States are expected to be the main drivers of this programme and the role of Government of India would be largely facilitative. The District Magistrate will be the fulcrum of this programme, leading the transformation process from the front. For smooth running of the programme, we would request you to form a Committee under your chairmanship and designate a Secretary level officer for each of the identified districts in your State so as to act as a bridge between the Centre and the District. Government of India would also nominate one Additional Secretary / Joint Secretary level officers as *Prabhari* for each of the identified districts. NITI Aayog has been entrusted with the task of coordinating and monitoring this special initiative. I would request that one of the Secretary level officers of the State may also be designated as the Nodal Officer for day-to-day interaction with us.

8. Since the strategy would include setting targets for various indicators to be achieved year wise upto 2022, a District Action Plan would need to be prepared for each identified district spelling out the blue print for achieving the targets.

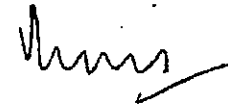

## MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

This Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) is made as on this \_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_, 20{•}, by and between:

1. **The Government of India**, represented by National Institution for Transforming India, and **The Government of \_\_\_\_\_**, referred jointly as **Authorities**,

### **WHEREAS:**

- A. The Authorities recognise that for rapid improvement of key socio-economic indicators, a focussed attention to identified backward districts is required.
- B. The Authorities further recognise that convergence of their efforts is key to transformation of districts. Further, they also recognise that appropriate target setting and real time monitoring of identified Key Performance Indicator ( KPI) is required for this purpose.
- C. They also recognise that Government of \_\_\_\_\_(name of the State) is the main driver of this programme;

In pursuance of the aforesaid, the Authorities hereto wish to record under this Memorandum of Understanding (MOU), their commitment for transforming the most backward districts of \_\_\_\_\_(name of the State).

### **ARTICLE 1 SCOPE OF THE MOU**

1.1 NITI Aayog and the Government of \_\_\_ would collectively identify problems which require assistance through the extant schemes and initiatives of the Gol and the State Government. Schemes/initiatives including the flexi-funds provided in Centrally Sponsored Schemes which could be used for this purpose would be mutually decided between the Authorities. NITI Aayog would be primarily responsible for facilitating and enhancing efficiency of existing initiatives of the Gol.

1.2 For this programme, the State Government would constitute a Committee headed by the Chief Secretary, comprising the Principal Secretary (Planning) and/or (Finance) (**State Committee**) and would also designate a Secretary or equivalent level officer for each district to work in partnership with the official designated by the Gol as provided in Clause 1.3 below.

1.3 The Gol would designate an Additional Secretary/Joint Secretary or equivalent officer for each identified district (**Gol Officer**) to coordinate with the State Government and together as a team would guide the District Administration in fulfilling the objectives of this programme.

1.4 Outcome of results under this programme would be monitored jointly through a dashboard created by NITI Aayog and State Government.

1.5 The Government of \_\_\_\_\_(state) shall prepare a detailed District Development Plan with specific action plan and timelines to bring the identified Backward Districts at par with the State average in the indicators identified by NITI.
